Since last summer, Daisy Dixon has stepped down as co-coordinator, and Genevieve continues as the regional contact.

We have held monthly online-art making sessions since June 2023, bringing together a mixture of art therapists and associate members for relaxed, reflective art making and chat. The sessions have explored using music, 5-rhythms, intuitive and bilateral mark-making to facilitate reflections and connections. This friendly peer group is open to members who want to practice hosting a group or test out a new approach.

Our summer 2023 meet-up was held over a picnic at Birmingham Botanical Gardens, and the winter in-person gathering was also in Birmingham, at GAP Arts community centre. The midwinter meeting included hearing from three members who work in different settings, who kindly presented a little about their approach and current issues.

In-person CPD has been in the form of two workshops run by artist, Sarah Goudie, who uses bilateral and intuitive mark-making to explore the embodied experience of large-scale drawing. Run in Stourbridge and Worcester, the workshops were a blend of nourishing self-care for members, and something for the toolkit with clients.

On-line CPD offerings for members have included a choice of modules run by complex trauma expert, Carolyn Spring; and a 12-part programme, Embodied Approaches to Psychotherapy, run by Confer. Online trainings have been followed up with online peer groups to discuss and share the learning.

Examples: using a workshop format to present working with children and young people with sensory impairment. Presenting work with a patient with personality disorder who exhibited

ambivalence towards engaging with the therapeutic process, leading to a discussion about dilemma or double bind which affected the personality and sense of identity of the person. The difficulties of engaging with clients with severe ADHD, setting up a service with children in an NHS setting and the need for clarifying therapeutic boundaries. A discussion about institutional dynamics and internal politics in the context of changes to the whole service impacting the delivery of the Art Therapy service.

Activities

Fulfilling our mission statement

BAAT Scotland upholds a grassroots, *bottom up* ethos. In order to meet the aims of BAAT Scotland's mission statement, we have aimed to gather the views of the members, and respond to what has been communicated to us. A desire for opportunities to meet, particularly inperson for peer support, training and CPD, has consistently emerged from the membership. Members have also sought support in various areas of practice from the members of BAAT Scotland Council, and there is a history of an expressed need for a stronger professional presence acting transparently on behalf of BAAT members in Scotland, that is engaged in Scotlish political and decision-making bodies.

Raising the profile

To cultivate, support and promote meaningful connections and creative growth for BAAT members in Scotland, we have increased the visibility of BAAT Scotland by sending out regular updates to BAAT members and creating possibilities for art therapists to gather together in person in Scotland through continued meetings in the regional groups, for example, at seminars organised by the Children and Young People Scotland SIG and at the BAAT Scotland AGM.

BAAT Scotland is becoming more known and recognised as a point of contact or resource by other professional bodies. Recent contacts have included:

- Forth Valley NHS working on a project with NHS Education for Scotland promoting the Return to Practice pathway and resources for Art Therapists and other AHPs
- Care Inspectorate Scotland have asked if we can provide any case studies for a publication they are producing, showcasing the work of AHP's in care homes with older people.
- Scotland Practice Guidelines on working with adopted children.

In response to new guidelines in England and other parts of the UK, Vicky Aston, (CYP rep) led a review of the BAAT Scotland practice guidelines on working with adopted children, young people, and their families to be published on BAAT website.

Meetings:

BAAT Scotland Council met quarterly throughout the year, both online and in-person. BAAT Scotland held the AGM on 9th March. This was a full-day event, offering both in-person and online attendance, including a presentation and workshop on response art by Sarah Warren; Claire-Louise Vaculik also attended representing BAAT, in her role of Chair.

BAAT (UK) Review and consultation:

BAAT Scotland Council have been in conversation with Gary and Claire Louise to discuss how BAAT (UK) can best support the Scottish membership. This has involved the apparent suspension of the Scottish Policy Officer post, which has not been re-advertised. BAAT Scotland Council have been making the case to BAAT (UK) for the need and continuation of this post, but it is unclear if the post will remain under the revised structures.

Gary and Claire Louise Visit:

In September, BAAT Scotland hosted a visit from Gary Fereday and Claire Louise, who travelled from London to meet with BAAT Scotland Council and other Scotlish members.

Inside-outsider exhibition:

BAAT Scotland were delighted to provide a supporting statement for this exhibition by mental health practitioners with dual experience. The Exhibition was organised by Don McJimpsy in collaboration with in2gr8 mental health. Bridget, as the BAAT Scotland Chair also gave a short address as the opening, along with other contributors. BAAT Scotland were proud to be a part of this important event.

Addressing Members professional issues and concerns:

BAAT members in Scotland are invited to contact the Chair to seek advice or support for any professional issues. If we are unable to help, we can signpost and advise. Bridget in her role as chair, notices an increased level of enquiries, which suggests that the profile of BAAT Scotland is raising amongst Scottish members.

Mary Anne Leaving:

BAAT Scotland are so very sorry to be saying goodbye to Mary Anne Ibe, as BAAT Scotland Race and Culture Rep. Mary Anne_joined in 2020 and she has made an invaluable and rich contribution to the work and development of BAAT Scotland Council and to the area she represents. We will miss her greatly on BAAT Scotland Council!

BAAT Scotland Council Representatives Updates

a) NHS Adult Mental Health: Alex Taneus Miller

The Arts Therapies NHS Scotland Strategic Development Group

- The group continues to meet, with representation from an increasing number of health boards.
- The group seeks to represent Art Therapy, Music Therapy and Dramatherapy.
- Agenda items include:
- o Sharing updates about service development and good practice from local board areas, including the creation of new posts
- o Influencing recruiters to include the Arts Therapies as eligible professions within generic job descriptions.
- Liaising with NHS Education Scotland (NES) about the commissioning of funded
 Arts Therapies specific clinical supervision training; this is ongoing.
- Maintaining and updating a census of Arts Therapists employed in NHS Scotland health boards.
- Engaging with NES around issues of how the training needs of Arts Therapists are understood and met.

Creation of new posts in NHS boards

- New fixed term and substantive posts have been created in CAMHS in Greater Glasgow and Clyde and Lothian and in the prisons service in Greater Glasgow & Clyde.
- The Principal Arts Therapist in NHS Forth Valley is currently working to secure a further Art Therapist post in CAMHS, subject to funding being approved.

Registered Art Therapists who are employed within other roles.

- Primary Care Mental Health Workers (PCMHWs) who are trained as Art Therapists and employed in various boards across NHS Scotland have started a peer support group.
- Anyone who is qualified as an Art Therapist in the NHS but who is not employed as such
 is strongly encouraged to contact me to discuss ways of engaging with the profession.
 National Service Specification for the Delivery of Psychological Therapies and Interventions in
 Scotland

This specification has been developed, "...to serve as an innovative national guide of what high quality psychological care and practice looks like so you know what to expect, and [it describes] how services should deliver this to meet local needs." This publication is the outcome of the consultation that took place between October 2022 and February, and which was discussed at the 2023 BAAT AGM. Although it is intended to be a guide for all psychological therapy practice rather than for specific modalities, the document is in fact not representative of the broad range of professions that make up psychological therapies. In recognition of this, the Heads of Psychology Services who put the document together have convened the Psychological Care and Practice Forum to support implementation of the above specification and any other 'relevant cross government issues', although the precise terms of reference are still being drafted. Membership of the forum is intended to represent all key stakeholders who support delivery of psychological care and practice across Scotland and includes Art Therapy, for which I am the rep. Meetings will be ongoing every three months and I will report back to members through the BAAT Scotland newsletters.

b). Race and Culture: Mary Anne Ibe

Race and Culture Summary Report 2020-2023

I have been BAAT Scotland Race and Culture Representative since November 2020. My time as a council Scotland rep has been diverse, expansive in personal and practice development and a continual learning experience of support and strategic development. Since my initial involvement at the 2020 Scotland AGM where I was voted in as rep council member, I have undertaken tasks and responsibilities to support the membership. 2020 Scotland AGM I presented my 'Face2Face' A black Art Therapists experiences and reflections: Working with clients's racial narratives when processing conflict and how to meet with empathy. The presentation focused on themes of therapeutic relationship beyond the contained space and development of therapeutic alliance exploring skin tones, cultural backgrounds and communication approaches on these topics. This was followed by an experiential self-portrait workshop and small group discussions. I have been guest lecturing at QMU Art Therapy Masters course for year 1 presenting the Face2Face presentation and workshop 2021 and moving forward in future practice sessions at QMU.

2021 brought more experience in strategic and consultation support with BAAT UK alongside other Art Therapists across England, Wales and Northern Ireland to develop the EDI Equality, Diversity and Inclusion Policy and Strategy document followed by taking part in BAAT UK Council AGM July 2021 "Doing the work: Understanding Trauma and the impact of racism and

disadvantage" presentation alongside Corrina Eastwood and Judy Ryde. My presentation "Community Advocacy and Racism in Art Therapy: racial awareness working with families and professionals in art therapy".

2022 I was invited to present and facilitate an experiential workshop on the integration of Art Therapy with the Dan Hughes Developmental Dyadic Psychotherapy model for children in care. The CYP SIG one day seminar at Dundee Contemporary Arts venue in October 2022 was the first in-person one day seminar, it was a great day of exploring practice and togetherness with Scotland membership. The year also had gueries and request from the Scotland membership regarding immigration issues and with forward discussions with BAAT UK and Scotland government officials. This led to being part of a working group with other professionals across various industry sectors to give feedback Scotland policies and procedures regarding visa process and paperwork for individuals and organisations. This year from March to December I have facilitated monthly cultural heritage practice sessions, an online closed group for people from diverse cultural groups to explore selves and practice experiences with considerations to intersectionality, race and culture topics. The Race and Cultural Scotland BAAT Representative role has scope for so much more networking, support, and facilitation for the Scotland membership unfortunately I am no longer in a position personally and professionally to continue my journey in this role. Role and responsibilities are:

Working closely with BAAT Scotland and UK Council and Scottish Region reps, the race and culture representative will ensure that BAAT diversity, equality, race and culture agendas are successfully implemented and in line with overall BAAT Scotland objectives for art therapists practice, research and training in Scotland. It also important to have an awareness and active interest of the wider context of UK/European and global policy trends/changes which may affect art therapists and clients in Scotland. Understanding regional/local and national, social, political art therapy/therapy trends and ability to timely communicate amongst cohorts to improve BAAT community and diversity for the BAAT workforce and client group in Scotland.

c). Children and Young People: Jo Jones and Victoria Aston

Jo was part of making a professional video of young people and their experience of Art Therapy which should be on the BAAT Instagram soon. She also joined the Mental Health Forum in Edinburgh network to represent Art Therapy especially representing CYP. She also attended SVCO (Scottish Council for Voluntary Organisations) networking event to promote art therapy in the third sector. Maintains and responds to CYP BAAT email and has also joined the planning team for CYP SIG upcoming events.

Vicky is re-connecting back into an NHS role, after a long period away from work due to cancer treatment. Vicky is currently reviewing the BAAT Scotland practice guidelines on working with adopted children, young people, and their families, and this will be published on BAAT website following verification.

d). Learning Disabilities: Portia Velarde

As part of my role as the BAAT Scotland Learning Disabilities representative and within my role working with people with LD in the NHS, I attended Scotland's Learning Disability and Gender-Based Violence Conference 2023 where a new report was launched titled "Unequal, Unheard, Unjust: But not Hidden Anymore. Women with Learning Disabilities' Experience of Gender Based

Violence in Scotland."

This report was produced by 'People First (Scotland)'s Equally Safe Group' and the 'Scottish Commission for People with Learning Disabilities' and can be found on the SCLD website. The report captures the experiences of women with learning disabilities across Scotland in a powerful, moving way. The findings are deeply concerning, highlighting the inconsistent support available to these women at both local and legislative levels. It was important to attend alongside other professionals throughout the NHS and across the wider health and social care sector, to really think together about how best to support people who are experiencing, affected by or at risk of Gender Based Violence in Scotland going forward. In my role as the BAAT Scotland representative for Art Therapists working with people with Learning Disabilities in Scotland, I am looking to begin a scoping exercise to identify other Art Therapist's working in this field. This could then provide a way for us to connect, sharing professional experience and insights.

e). Gaelic: Catriona MacInnes

Catriona described something of her experience as a Gael in relation to her own experience of the culture and language being 'endangered' and as an art therapist working in the Western Isles. She is currently undertaking doctoral research at UHI on the losses and experience of Gaels and trans-generational trauma and exploring adaptation of art therapy to this work. She asked anyone interested to get in touch.

Scottish CYP SIG

Co-ordinated by Lauren Fox McGloughlan and Catriona MacInnes the work of the CYP SIG continues with two annual in-person seminars. In 2023 we held seminars on art therapy work in the fields of trauma and alcohol and addictions. The seminars have included two presentations by art therapists active in these fields in Scotland and a substantial amount of time for experiential art making and peer discussion and support. They have been fully attended and as they are open to art therapists across Scotland have been offered in various cities in Scotland to date. The Scotland CYP SIG gives opportunity for Scottish based art therapists to come together to examine various aspects of work, to present, explore and support research and ongoing work and to use the SIG as a sounding board for presenting art therapy work amongst peers. We have continued after lockdown to offer four online sessions alternating between presentation and case study and art making. On 10th May we held an in- person seminar initiated by two members of the group on the subject of (m)motherhood with a Keynote presentation by Dr Susan Hogan.

Wales

Name of coordinator(s): Jess Gordon and Claire Aldridge

Dates of meetings held since July 2023 (with number of attendees):

10 June 2023 - 29 members attended (12 in person; 17 online)

14 October 2023 – 5 members (online – recording shared with all members)

20 April 2024 – 9 members (in person)

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

In June 2023 members met in Swansea for An Introduction to Sandtray Therapy with Dr Kirsty Bilski. This was a valuable insight into the possibilities of sandtray work and how it might be integrated with art therapy. Kirsty provided both theory and experiential learning in a highly enjoyable session. Online attendance was opened to members from other regions. Feedback from participants:

'Just wanted to say THANK YOU for organising that. I loved, loved, loved it. I've always been curious about sandtray therapy, definitely feel like I got more of a handle now and understand its process and powers..... Kirsty was magnificent.'

Our online AGM in July was poorly attended, but feedback via email regarding activities and plans for the Region was positive and members were happy for us to continue as coordinators.

On 14 October 2023 we held an online CPD Meeting: Getting Started with Practice-based Research with Ali Coles. The session was a valuable introduction and encouragement to dip a toe into research with plenty of practical advice on how to get started. Although attendance was low at the event, a recording of the session was made available to members who were unable to attend, which has been appreciated.

On 20 April we held a two-hour Felt-making workshop in Abergavenny in response to requests for some hands-on sharing of creative skills. Expertly facilitated by Petra Pinnock, it was an enjoyable opportunity to learn about the therapeutic qualities of felt and to connect and network with others.

Feedback from participants: 'I've loved igniting my crafty side again – it was really needed.' 'Fantastic opportunity to connect with self and others in a creative activity. Thank you!' Plans for the rest of the year include a gallery visit, an outdoor art making session, an evening of case presentations (postponed from last year) and CPD on ableism, disablism and postableist positions in the arts therapies delivered by Beth Pickard.

Issues: as co-ordinators we feel that members in our region still do not use the forum enough or recognize that it is there as a medium for connection and networking – how could this be better signposted and promoted? The geographical range of our region continues to make it difficult to serve all members equally, given the uneven distribution – we would like to hold events in the north and west of Wales, but are not confident that enough members will attend – in the meantime we provide online opportunities but feel that some members are missing out on the in-person events.

ADD SIG - Art therapy and addictions

Name of group: Addiction Sig: Group for art therapists with an interest in addictions.

Dates of meetings held since July 2023 (with number of attendees):

August 2023, Carol put out a call for suggestions /themes for meetings in October 7th which no members attended.

Addsig meeting on 2nd December with art therapist/animator Tony Gammidge. Approximately 12 people attended CPD certificates were sent out.

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

In August Carol sent out an email asking members if they would like to put forward a suggestion for a meeting in September. One member came back with a suggestion: 'Can Addiction Sometimes Hide Psychosis". This was not taken up and the meeting was cancelled.

An informal meeting was posted with a focus on self-care for October 7th there was little interest and also confusion regarding where to post the date and zoom link (Google group or forum) and this meeting was also cancelled.

An Addsig meeting was held on 2nd December with Art therapist/animator, Tony Gammidge. This went well, it included interactive artmaking, Q & A's and lively discussion - twelve members attended.

There are currently 95 Addsig members listed on the BAAT Website. Both co-ordinators are looking to stand down and feel that new, lively and energetic co-ordinators will benefit this potentially strong and interesting group.

ATAH SIG – Art therapy and homelessness

Dates of meetings held since July 2023 (with number of attendees): Roughly 12, did not keep track apologies.

Summary of activity this year outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

A new member has taken on the role of the homelessness special interest group coordinator in December 2023 after previous coordinators being unable to continue in the role.

The group has begun meeting again virtually since January 2024 with an intention of quarterly meetings. There was appreciation of it starting again and members connecting in a difficult time for the sector.

Overall themes have been of loss due to projects and funding being suddenly cut.

There has been discussion of a new group starting with a collective response to isolation as well as an initiative to have a speaker in for a CPD session on successful funding bids. There have also been new members joining.

ATCAF SIG – Art therapy with children, adolescents and families

Dates of meetings held since July 2023 (with number of attendees):

Saturday 25th November 2023 –online - 12 attendees Saturday 3rd February 2024 – in person – 10 attendees Tuesday 19th March 2024 – online – 12 attendees

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

The group meetings have been focussing on the challenges of working within education; making time to create and share art and to nourish each other in the shared space. All of the meetings have been attended by art therapists at varied stages of their careers, from trainees, newly qualified or more experienced practitioners. A wide range of geographical areas and types of school have been represented and one FE college.

Challenges: the main concerns have been: budget constraints - school budgets are being squeezed tightly, it seems to be a lottery, there are cuts being made to therapy services in some schools, whilst others show an increased commitment.

Defining our role as art therapists continues to be a difficulty, being referred to as play therapists seems to be the most common misnomer. Educating school staff about art therapy and its uses can be a challenge. Many people have no idea what art therapy is and will say to students 'have fun' as they are being collected for sessions. It is a delicate conversation, to explain to school staff, what therapy sessions potentially entail.

Holding the physical boundaries can also be difficult, explaining to school staff that therapy sessions should not be interrupted or even asking to have a working door on the therapy room can be awkward and not received well.

Some schools asking therapists to take on more clients in a day as they try to maximise their resources is another concern raised by many. Holding the boundaries of what is manageable can be very difficult for our members.

Highlights: hearing and sharing how adaptable and creative art therapists are at carving out their roles within schools, how quality outcomes can be achieved through art therapy which is being delivered in rooms with carpet, no sink and very few materials is inspirational. Sharing CPD experiences has been helpful.

Making art together has been nourishing for all attendees, sharing experiences of work, the highs and lows, has been helpful in what can be a very solitary job. The main strength of these meetings has been feeling 'not alone' within our profession.

Our Group had been in abeyance for a while, due to poor attendance at meetings and technical issues. However, improved tech issues have aided better communication within the group, and increased responsiveness from members. The regular SIG Co-ordinators meetings, online, has been a great support, so there is now more energy and momentum in the group. The SIG Co-ordinators Pack has also been very helpful as a guide, with clear aims.

A SIG member in Scotland has been enthusiastic about the group, and in her other role as a Stress Management Co-ordinator, has invited SIG members to occasional free online talks from speaker at their organisation, as relevant. This has provided some extra interest and input for the group.

We now have a Zoom account set up for meetings, with three planned for this year. Two group members have offered to share talks and videos of their work at our meetings. We will also look at inviting some outside speakers.

I'm not sure about arranging real-life meetings, due to geography.

We are also exploring linking up with other SIG groups for events.

Having thought of stepping down last year, I am continuing this year, although it would be helpful to have another co-ordinator, so that the group would continue – one co-ordinator leaves the group vulnerable.

I have also appreciated the support from BAAT office, and the discount on courses, it makes us feel appreciated. One group member is writing her dissertation in this area. I feel art therapy and art-therapy based consultancy with staff, and organisations is under-represented in BAAT, and that this could be a valuable area for future business development.

The Creative Response SIG

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

The Creative Response SIG has continued to grow over the past year. We currently have 239 members, an increase from last year's 145. The SIG is coordinated by a committee of four people, and collectively we have hosted a total of eight online gatherings as part of the 'Feeling A/part' series of events, which have been attended by approximately 84 people throughout the year.

'Feeling A/part' offers the chance for SIG members to meet, socialise, and listen in on an 'in conversation with...' style session, where one member of the Creative Response will interview another about a specific project, intervention, or piece of research. A wide range of topics have been explored this year, as outlined above. Each event has been attended by between 8 and 12 people online, and feedback indicates that members who have been unable to attend have valued the opportunity to watch sessions that have been recorded.

Although the SIG's area of focus of loss is relevant to art therapists working across a wide range of settings, many of our members work in the context of hospice and palliative care, and bereavement support. The hospice sector is facing considerable challenge at present; hospices are charitable organisations that are significantly impacted by the cost-of-living crisis. The Feeling A/part sessions have assisted supportive relating between members, who are often solo art therapists working in isolation within multi-disciplinary teams, and provided informal CPD when funding may be scarce.

Some Feeling A/part topics have facilitated impact beyond the SIG and enabled collaboration with other SIGs through naturally aligned subjects of exploration. February's session was a moving and rich example of this, with Adam Levene sharing his experiences of working online with a man with MND. Participants in this session included members of the Neuro SIG. November's hybrid session invited participants to view and discuss an art therapy archive included in a Wellcome funded project at London Metropolitan Archives. Taking place in person, the session was also recorded to enable online viewings via the forum. In April, representatives from a collective of art therapists working in palliative care in Singapore showcased artworks and experiences from their recent exhibition entitled 'big big SMALL SMALL'. This versatile network of connection and understanding for colleagues near and far offers nourishment and sustenance to art therapists in challenging times.

Despite encountering challenges and uncertainty, art therapists working in the sector continue to innovate, developing and sharing best practice. One example is Nana Zhvitiashvili and Paula Boyle from Harlington Hospice, who presented their project developing best practice in working with neurodiverse children in bereavement at a multi-disciplinary palliative care conference in May 2024, an initiative that has previously won an award at the national Hospice UK conference in 2023.

We are in the process of planning an in-person study day, which we hope will take place in the early Autumn. The focus is likely to be on trauma-informed practice in palliative care.

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

It's been a really positive year for the CYP Scotland SIG and we've had 2 very successful inperson seminar days, as well as regular online meetings. The online meetings alternate between case studies/practice-sharing & art-making together. We've had good feedback throughout the year from all participants.

A highlight was the seminar day we had earlier this month, attended by 50 art therapists. Speakers included Dr Susan Hogan as well as BAAT Scotland Chair Bridget Grant, alongside other art therapists presenting their own work. We plan to continue to run 2 x in-person seminar days per year, with 4 online sessions as well, meaning there is something happening bi-monthly for the SIG.

I'd say the primary issue we have encountered this year is discovering that our seminar days cannot be 'BAAT accredited', even though they are organised by BAAT members, on behalf of and for BAAT members only. It's not been clear why such events wouldn't be BAAT credited and what we would need to do to make them so.

Another area of difficulty continues to be the communication with SIG members. The forum communications seem to be much improved, and messages do reach group members as far as I can tell which is a huge improvement, thank you! The email system is clunky though and it's frustrating and time-consuming to have to email group members individually with general updates & information. If there was a way to be able to send group emails that aligned with GDPR requirements that would be very helpful.

The support of the BAAT admin and finance teams has continued to be invaluable, and we really appreciate the timely and efficient communication especially from Federica and Abimbola who are always really helpful.

The SIG continues to be an engaging source of interesting discussion, thought, networking and shared practice.

We continue to recruit new members through the Forum and now have 123 Members. We have met online this year.

Since July 23 we have had one meeting with a presentation on 28.10.23 'Questioning a body of material' thanks to Dr Debbie Michaels. This was a presentation on an art therapist's PHD work on reflexive response to working on a stroke unit' there were 12 attendees and as usual we had a good discussion and opportunity for creative reflection during the session.

Summary of activity this year, outlining any particular issues and/or highlights for the group (max 500 words):

Sally Weston announced she was standing down last year and hoped to recruit new coordinator(s). She did not take on organising speakers as she hoped to hand this over or work with the new coordinator(s) to do this. She has put out a number of requests, but no response so far. A final request has now gone out.

In Spring 2023 Louise Smart, BAAT professional advisor contacted us re revising the Art therapy and Neurological Conditions Guidelines we produced some years ago. Sally put out a call for interested people and in July 2023 a small working group (8 people) convened to update Guidelines. We have met 4 or 5 times by zoom, once with Louise Smart, and communicated by email. This has been a worthwhile experience.

Whilst keeping most of the existing guidelines, in the light of the recent HPCP guideline updates we looked at the following issues:

Inclusivity, equality and diversity; consent and effective communication; developments in

digital skills and technology, care for therapists own mental health and fitness to practice. In addition, we expanded sections on supporting and working with carers and multidisciplinary/trans disciplinary working.

This has taken longer than anticipated but we are close to finishing and look forward to sharing this with other art therapists working with people with neurological conditions.

SIPP SIG – Art therapy and Self Employed, Independent and Private Practice

SIPPSIG ANNUAL REPORT for 2024 AGM.

The SIPPSIG continues to meet to support art therapists who are Self employed, working Independently and in Private Practice. We have had a number of meeting during the past year. These have been in person, blended and online. The average attendance for each meeting has been around 20 members. The format for these meetings have been as open forums where practitioners can bring the issues they are facing with clients and more broadly social concerns that affect clients and therapists alike.

In Feb 2024 this sig jointly drafted a letter to Council about these concerns, focusing on how the ongoing cost of living crisis was affecting clients and therapists.

SIPPSIG themes, concerns, and questions arising over the past year, are listed below.

- •The need to "begin a conversation" within BAAT about the circumstances in which we are now working. Are we still a profession engaged in social activism? What would we like BAAT (remembering we are BAAT BAAT is still an association) to do? What can we do? Can BAAT be more vocal? represent this argument? Acknowledge the crisis? Look after art therapists in this climate?
- •Working with trauma in the present (due to Govt benefits systems, cuts to services, global conflicts, climate breakdown, etc) not only with historical trauma breaking through to the present. This means a new way of working.
- •How we can be witness to and work with/against fragmentation in the work and the environment in which it takes place and in which we also live. It was suggested that the SIG structure within BAAT and the NHS medical model may also represent a kind of fragmentation into separate, compartmentalised client/patient groups. Can we act against this by offering a collective space? Have we lost a sense of community that the very large group BAAT Zoom lectures brought? We thought about the art practice of collage, of bringing together disparate ideas to form a whole and whether the SIG could call for a

similar process of reflection within the profession.

- •Because of both the constant high level of need experienced in education and the insecure funding of art therapy work we wonder if we can link these concerns to campaigns (outside BAAT) for therapy in all schools and a longexpressed (within BAAT) need for a pay structure in educational settings.
- •Budget deficits in local Councils leading to cutting art therapy provision and arts programmes in general. There are pots of money related to, for example, crime reduction. Can art therapists help the Councils to meet their aims possible new funding streams. Are Community Interest Companies a future route for art therapy work and if so, what support do we need in this area?
- •How can the profession better represent the diversity of the people we work with? HCPC stats on the background of art therapists appears to represent privilege but also that we are the only state regulated profession with no funding for our training.
- •The current economic climate can cause a crisis in confidence in what we do. Hard to hold on to the value of "just" providing and holding a space for thinking. Managers may on the other hand dissociate from the distress. Can we consider the 'power over' and 'power with' dynamics? Staci K Haines "The Politics of Trauma: Somatics, Healing and Social Justice" book recommended.
- •The flux that Covid brought to the therapy world, offering increasing flexibility, can be a good thing, but constant adaptation can lead to an impoverishment of stamina and strength. We noted that the natural world and its seasons of rest and renewal shows us the need for balance and the dangers of constant exhaustion of resources in the pursuit of higher productivity. If we dissociate from this we will not notice the damage in time. Might we record the adaptations we are being required to make in our selfemployed and private practice that diverge from the models we learned in our trainings?
- •How is BAAT engaging with the forthcoming Labour government?
- •We noted that if BAAT AGM returned to being an in-person event we would like to propose a "large group" at the AGM; a reflective meeting which we could offer to host.

We planned an evening in 2 parts: The first supported a reflective discussion on a paper, 'Landscape of loss: art therapy outdoors and traumatic bereavement' by Ashlynn Wardle, a runner up in last year's New Practitioner writing prize. This was

followed by a creative and therapeutic activity providing an opportunity to make art and creative writing around the theme of the evening using natural / found objects. Highlights came through feedback from participants after the session. One participants said that she wanted to share with us that she was really inspired by our event and the next day asked one of her clients if they would like to do outdoor therapy with her. Another trainee fed back the following:

"I just want to say a big thank you for co-ordinating and facilitating Tuesday night's meet up; it was so inspiring and relevant for me and the paper really made me realise that 'I think I could have a go at this' and that papers don't have to be long and convoluted! I am really keen to integrate nature-based AT into my emerging practice and I am currently on placement within a hospice. Today I lead a group and some one-one's using the activity you had us engage with and it was so powerful and profound for people. We also discovered that the Bobolink is an American bird with an awesome song! Big thanks again."
